Objectifs : To explore the writing, orature and other cultural performances of Indigenous peoples in Canada with attention to questions of representation, identity, territory, language, and cultural memory.

Contenu : Indigenous theory and research methods, postcolonial studies and neocolonialism, and various genres such as creation myths, residential school narratives, protest literature, trickster tales, conversion narratives, native autobiography, traditional stories, chants and songs. Popular and literary forms of the "imaginary Indian" and legal and historical discourses on the Indian and the Métis in Canada and Quebec.

To learn and understand the importance of Indigenous cultures across Turtle Island. To critically engage with questions related to decolonization, survivance, postcolonialism, Indigenous methodologies, and self-determination.

Précisions sur le contenu

We will be looking at a variety of texts, in both English and French, written by Indigenous authors. This will include drama, poetry, novels, films, accounts, and music. The goal is to consider the wide range of voices that have or are currently shaping Indigenous culture in Turtle Island across both historical periods and geographical regions.

Approche pédagogique

During our meetings we will engage in critical discussions about the texts we have studied, participate in student presentation question periods, and help each other navigate new ways and forms of thinking through Indigenous literature and culture.

Évaluation

Class presentations, thesis proposal and bibliography, final research paper.

A selected bibliography will be distributed for theoretical and literary texts in French and English.
