# ANG733 - Anglo-Quebec and Franco-Canadian Literature (3 crédits)

#### **DESCRIPTEURS:**

**Objectifs:** This seminar will allow graduate students to become familiar with the production

of "minority" literatures and discourses in Canada and Quebec. Questions related to cultural identity, collective memory, linguistic "interference", intercultural

dialogue, and discourses of nationhood will be explored.

Contenu: The bilingual corpus will shed light upon the representation of Anglophone

minorities in Quebec and Francophone minorities in English Canada. Theoretical readings on multiculturalism, interculturalism, minority and identity politics, and translation studies will inform a bilingual corpus of representative novels, short

stories, plays, and poetry published since 1920.

#### ANG733 - Anglo-Quebec and Franco-Canadian Literature

## **Objectives**

The objectives of this course include: providing students with an overview of the theoretical discourses on minority subjectivity and apply them to the critical analysis of literary texts; developing the skills needed to undertake original research and scholarship at the graduate level from a variety of theoretical perspectives.

# **Content**

Theoretical and critical texts on minority subjectivity in Canadian/Quebec context as well as a corpus of literary texts (novels, plays, short stories, films) by linguistic minorities.

#### **Pedagogical Approach**

This course will combine lectures, student-led presentations, discussions, and close analysis of the literary and theoretical texts included in the syllabus. Students will be expected to read both primary and secondary material before each class, and actively engage in class discussions through their questions, presentations, comments, and interpretive analysis of each week's material.

# **Evaluation**

Presentations on assigned critical essays and literary texts; 1 short critical essay; 1 research prospectus; 1 final research essay.
